Keys

For anyone who has ever heard the name Silicon Valley, it must bring to mind a booming hub for tech industry, but it also has its downsides. The fact that new businesses continue to attract new employees and inhabitants, the phenomenon also contributes to people leaving their families, and not everyone is lucky enough to find affordable housing.

It has already been a year and a half that the Gómez family sleep in a simple trailer parked in one of the trailer parks **scattered** around and in East Palo Alto, a **poverty-stricken** neighborhood in Silicon Valley. David, **who** is the father of three daughters and the husband of Mariela, goes and wakes up his daughters. It's 7am, and time for them to start preparing for school. **All the girls** share a bed above the driver's cab, as the trailer serves as a home for five people. Even so, their parents are **committed** to trying to give them the best possible **opportunities** in life, despite their **economic** situation. The family members also support **each other** day in and day out.

When walking around East Palo Alto, **over and over again** you encounter people living in similar squalid circumstances as the Gómez family. The **abysmal** differences in the living conditions of the **underprivileged** and the rich are **anything but** hidden as there are **affluent** neighborhoods, with their **lush** green lawns and well-maintained **hedges** just a stone's throw away from the poor East Palo Alto. So close, but so **far apart**.

The Gómez receive some help with their everyday necessities from a local **NGO**. They are lucky because they cannot even afford **public health care** at times. David is a proud father and would never have imagined himself accepting **charity**. "No, no, you **mustn't**," he always used to say when **someone** offered to help. Then he started knowing better. The **unemployment** rate in East Palo Alto is horrific, and the salary that the family earns barely allows them to provide for their daughters.

The reason for so many people living in humble trailers has been the huge rise in housing prices. Originally, East Palo Alto was a simple neighborhood populated mostly by Latinos and Afro-Americans. Later, in the wake of the technological boom, more and more **Europeans** moved to the area, which increased rent costs. Now homelessness doesn't distinguish between black, white, or Latino. The reality is that **anyone** may end up having nothing. There are teachers **many of whom** either have to commute for two to three hours every morning to their workplace or live in shared apartments with other professionals. Facebook announced in 2016 that it would make a 18.5-million-dollar **contribution** to affordable housing in the area. It remains to be seen whether their initiative will **be able to** ease the plight of homeless people any time soon.
