What is inclusive language?

Inclusive language is language that does not degrade, insult, exclude or stereotype people on the basis of their disability, race or gender.

Disabilities

 Put the person first, not the disability. Instead of deaf people say people who are hard of hearing.

Race

- Only refer to a person's race if it's relevant to the point you are making.
 Use adjectives, rather than nouns, when you need to identify someone's race.
- If it is important to refer to a person's cultural background, use the term preferred by the individuals themselves, e.g. African-American, native Canadian.

Gender

- Degender, don't re-gender.
 a chairman → a chair (NOT a chairwoman)
- Replace occupational terms containing -man with terms that include both genders.

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a policeman → a police officer
a postman → a postal worker
mankind → humanity
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- Avoid occupational -ette and -ess endings.
- · Avoid the pronoun he when both sexes are included. Instead use the plural they.

Give each pupil his books as soon as he arrives.

→ Give each pupil their books as soon as they arrive.

Anyone who wants to take part in the competition must sign his name on the list.

→ Those who want to take part in the competition must sign their names on the list.

- Do not define women in terms of men use names instead of John's wife or Winston's widow.
- English often has lots insulting terms for women but no equivalent for men.
 It's worth avoiding some of the most obvious ones like spinster, cow and bitch.
