People who change our lives

One in four US teenagers say they are more influenced by celebrities than people they know. In a recent poll they said musicians, sports stars and actors were important role models. The power of family

Many celebrities cite the influence of their families in their success. Suzanne Collins, who wrote *The Hunger Games*, says her father, a US army officer, was an inspirational person. "I didn't think I drew well enough, but I knew it made me happy," he said. Then everything changed. He met Lynda Barry, another art college student. She was selling her comic strips to newspapers, so he decided to try doing the same thing. The decision changed his life.

Anthony Padilla and Ian Hecox became friends in high school. They created a comedy website *Smosh.com* that was originally intended as a forum for their high school classmates. The popularity of their YouTube videos rapidly spread beyond their small circle to millions of viewers from all over the world.

Talented teachers

Zac Efron has starred in a string of Hollywood hit movies. He says his passion for acting came from his drama teacher Robyn Metchik. "She pretty much embodied drama for me all through my high school years," he says. She was also the person who got him his break-through role in Disney's *High School Musical* movie.
