Extra 2

- 1. During the Chicago **Symphony Orchestra's** world premiere of Elliott Carter's Partita the lights in the concert hall suddenly went out.
- 2. After electricity was restored, **conductor** Daniel Barenboim continued with
- 3-4. **the piece** in G **minor**, but soon the orchestra was again surrounded by darkness.
- 5. Mr Barenboim became distracted and began conducting in 4/4 beat/rhythm instead of the prescribed 3/4.
- 6-8. The work didn't have a recognizable **melody** but the orchestra tried to match the **notes** to the new **rhythm/beat**.
- 9-10. Local music critics, never having heard this music before, gave the **performance** enthusiastic **reviews**.

Extra 3

- People have been making music almost as long as there have been people, probably for at least a hundred thousand years (at least).
- 2. By about 3100 BCE, musicians made/ were making instruments that could produce high and low notes.
- 3. We don't know what this early music sounded like because there was no way to write down notes or to record music.
- 4. The music of the Classical period has a recognisable melody/tune with accompaniment.
- 5. This allowed composers to replace singers as the focus of the music.
- 6. However, opera did not disappear as composers began/started producing operas for audiences in their own languages instead of Italian.
