Sunday 19.3.2023:

- On Sunday we flew to Keflavik and got very easily to the bus and to the Reykjavik. We couldn't get our apartment so early so we just left our luggage there and went to the city for a lunch. We ate fish of course, because it was local food and I am a home economics teacher. I always want to get known the locals foods and pastries. We also visited Hallgrimskirkja and saw the whole town bright and beautiful. Reykjavik is a very colourfull city, we would like to have some of that to our hometown too.
- After sightseeing we walked to the university. It is always easier to perseive the city, if you walk and follow the map. At University we met our new friends from 20 countries and we got some information about our course, the Structured Educational Visit to Schools & Training Seminars in Iceland.
- On the way back to the city centrum and our apartment we visited in food store and find out that Iceland is a very expensive country.



Monday 20.3.2023 morning

- We visited in the School of education-University of Iceland to hear about the education system in Iceland.
- We have a lot of similarities in our school system than in Iceland; children start school at the same age and graduate when they are 15 or 16 and during that time (called elementary school) they have same curriculum, maybe some differences between schools. Schools are mostly run and founded by the community, teachers have a university education, and they work quite autonomously. We don't have any school inspectors in Finland, like in Iceland and most of the European countries.
- The most interesting and inspirational is the national curriculum which is based on 6 fundamental 5 pillars
- 1. Literacy in the widest sense
- 2. Education towards sustainability
- 3. Health and welfare
- 4. Democracy and human rights
- 5. Equality
- 6. Creativity
- We got some tools for reflection on learning and educational encounters

Monday afternoon 20.3.2023

- Monday afternoon we had a field learning project I by the footsteps of the early Viking settlers among the geological wonders of the Iceland. We had a very good guide, I can't remember her name, but she was so good to tell us stories, sagas, history, geology....just name it. (Actually, the National museum on Wednesday seemed too flat after she was told everything so vividly and excitingly.)
- We visited first in the Gullfoss waterfall, which was icy, cold but awesome place to visit.
- Then we went to the geysire area, and it was so unprecedented experience... wau, never had I seen anything so powerfull and impressive!
- But that was not all. I saw a document on tv at home before I left of the first set of parliament.... it was a great surprise that we had opportunity to visit in that place for real. Very impressive place. It was also great to see and relive two tectonic plates in the same area. They diverge 2 cm per year and now the valley is almost 6 km wide.





Tuesday 21.3.2023 morning

- In the morning we visited in the **Saemundarskoli** School, which is located in the eastern part of Reykjavik. It is a primary school, and it looks still quite new, even if it was built in 2011.
- The facilities are very spacious, the classrooms contain all students in groups and give a lot of freedom to do work and projects. Teachers are working together, almost always two in the classroom.
- We got a very good lecture about the school's values and operating models. It was very impressive and interesting.

They don't give any numbers but colours and they support pupils and guide them to take responsibility of their own studies. I also liked the growth mindset- system they use everywhere in the school. These things I would like to bring to my own classroom and school in Finland.







Tuesday afternoon and evening 21.3.2023

After visiting in the school we had some lunch, local lamb soup inside the bread. Then we worked together with our group and made our own slide ready for Saturday. In the evening we went to the Sundhöll swimmingpool and met a Finnish couple there. It was snowing and the geothermal heat was relaxing us well.

We:


- learned to use Klappid and public transport.

Wednesday 22.3.2023

- We visited in the Háaleitisskóli, which was so near the centrum that we walked there. We had gret guides for the tour in the school. Two boys, who spoke very good english and were so polite and nice. They told us a lot of about studying in Iceland and we could visit almost everywhere in the schoolarea. That school was quite old, but still so light and spacious. In this school we noticed that they play chess a lot. They had chess tables in the liberary and we saw or guide to lose one game to a 8-year old boy.
- In this school we didn't get any lesson or guidance from teachers or headmaster, just walked with those two boys.
- After school we had a lunch meeting with part of our group and we made our reflection for Saturday together.
- In the afternoon we visited The National museum of Iceland (Field learning project II). It was nice to see all the staff but we had alread had so great lesson about Iclandic nation and history on our tour on Monday, that we just walked through the exhibits.
- We met a finnish woman in the museum cafe and had a good discussion with her. She is a formal teacher too. And can you belive that she was so nice that she and her Icelandic husband took us for a sightseeing tour by their car. We saw a light house, beach and the old harbour, which we wouldn't have seen without them. Sometimes it is easy to make new friends.








Thursday 23.3.2023

- We were tired and though that this would be a little bit useless visit to a third school and it would take almost an hour to get there with two busses.... and then we saw an ugly concrete building. Oh no, I thought....
- But what a school! Wau! The best visit for sure. I could follow the home economics teacher for couple
 of hours, she told me so much. They have courses from the first grade till the 10th. So practically
 they have 10 years to learn those things I have to do in one year, becouse in Finland we have home
 economics only in 7th grade. Pupils can choose some extra courses on 8th and 9th grade, but it is not
 for everyone. I hope that in our new school, which will be ready mayby on 2028, is possible to teach all
 pupils from first to 9th grade.
- This school, Helgafellsskóli, was new school, only 4 years old. They could create their own curriculum from the beginning. Teachers had teams for teaching their groups. Normally 40 pupils and 2 teacher or 60 pupils and 3 teacher. They teach almost everything but the arts and crafts subjects, to their own group. Teachers plan everything together. They have a lot of projects, where they can place all the substances, also arts and crafts. Parents will be invaited to the school 2-4 times per year to see what they have done. Pupils evaluate themselves and tell about that to their parents too. Teachers evaluate pupils too, and together with them. Teachers get to known their pupils well and you really saw and felt it in their classroom.
- There was a lot of practise I would love to bring to our school and curriculum. For me the best space at school was the greenhouse on the roof. I have my little garden in our school with some pupils, but this school on the mountains had a huge greenhouse! And just next to it there was balkony garden. What a great opportunity to grow vegetables and herbs for cooking and baking and learn a lot of gardening too.





This school was great surprise for me and totally worth to visit!


















Thursday afternoon

- There was huge basalt columns, the Halsanefshellir Sea Cave, and large rock formations that rise out of the sea. We were told to be careful when visiting there, the waves can crash ashore unexpectedly. You should keep away from the shoreline, and avoid turning your back towards the waves. It was easy to me, because I saw a little boy fall from the force of the wave and his parents just run away from him...I was almost running to help but luckily he got up and walked away from the beach.














The waterfalls Skogafoss and Seljalandsfoss

 which was beautiful and you could walk near to it's showering water mist...you needed to be carefull

- Seljandafoss and other smaller waterfalls next to it would have needed much more time. Unfortunately we
 had only 20 minutes and in that time you could barely take a foto and walk back to the buss. I will certainly
 visit that place again. Beautiful place and again one example of the nature power. That was easily seen in
 every place we visited. The enormous forces of nature around us make us think about our smallness

Saturday 25.3.2023 Presentation, Certificates and optional studies

- On Saturday 25.3.2023 we had our last meeting with the whole course, all 130
 participants and coordinators together. We had our presentation we had made with
 smaller groups and we got our certificates. I think I need more time to be able to
 take advantage of everything I have seen, experienced, learned and understood. This
 week has been so full of everything and I will certainly put what I have learned into
 use in my own work. The first thing I'm going to do is organize the photos and study
 the slides we went through in the lectures. I have already told my colleagues and my
 rector about those things and I hope that we can discuss them further later and
 hopefully learn something from Iclandic school system and sustainability.
- In the afternoon I still had an optional study of wool, yarns and dyeing. My Icelandic collague and friend took us to the open plant dye studio, Hespa, where I learned about the old tardition of plant dyeing. I had to buy some beautiful dyed Lettlopi yarn for my knitting project.
- Then we visited in the mini mill Uppspuni. They make 100% Icelandic wool yarn from their own sheeps. There I learedn how wool becomes a yarn. And now I would love to have my own sheep to have my own wool yarn. I have 2 dogs and I got some yarn of their fur and dyed and knitted a sweater of it but now I need to learn how to make the yarn by my self.
- Last place was the Secret lagoon. It is a man-made pool fed by naturally occurring hot springs located at **Hverahólmi**, the geothermal area next to the village of Flúðir in southern Iceland. It is the oldest pool in the country, and one of the most popular for locals and tourists alike. We were lucky because there was only 1 bus on the parking place when we went there. It was spacy enough to us and we relaxed there maybe one hour.
- Thank you all for this experience, I will go back to Iceland for sure! I still have a lot to learn and experience.
