FACTS ABOUT STONEHENGE

- 1 Stonehenge is as old as the pyramids of Egypt about 4000 years old.
- 2 The enormous stones have come all the way from Wales, over 300 kilometres away. No-one knows how primitive people were able to transport them.
- 3 The stones are positioned so that stonehenge can be used as a giant clock or calendar.
- 4 In the 1970s a fence was put around the stones to stop tourists from breaking them.
